Up to 15 participants aged 18+. For beginner picture book writers.




## WRITERS WORKSHOP WRITING FOR THEATRE AND CHARACTER DEVELOPMENT WITH CHRISTINE CROYDEN

## PANEL DISCUSSION THE POWER OF POSITIVE PUBLISHING – WRITING SELF-HELP


