Link Up Victoria

Link-Up Victoria helps the Stolen Generations, Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people who were removed from their families, and Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people searching for family who were removed. Link-Up can help you to access records about separation from family including adoption files, records from children's homes or other institutions and offer support with obtaining birth, death, and marriage certificates. They also provide referrals to link you to other services.
